## Waiting on the Savior:

Considering Christ's second coming in light of His first.

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone."

Isaiah 9:2 (ESV)

#### Introduction

By this time, in many tropical lands, including the northern parts of South America, the islands of the Caribbean, Central America, as well as the Southern USA, the Trade Winds have picked up, blowing what's called in my Island home of Jamaica, 'Christmas breeze'. Additionally, the naturally growing poinsettia have likely turned blood red at heart, forming those resplendent 'flowers' which are now a common feature in Christmas decorating. Their gradual transformation was a simple sign, to us children back home, that the joyous time called Christmas was on the way!

Our prayer is that this devotional will spark as much and even more joy and anticipation in your heart this Advent. As you read and meditate on these reflections and the Scriptures that inspired them, may they also stir in you a longing for the pending re-appearance of our Savior, Jesus Christ, and zeal to reach the lost with the good news of both His Advents. This response will fill both our hearts and that of Our Heavenly Father with exceeding great Joy!

## **Background**

Advent—the twenty-four days before Christmas, which like Lent, was originally forty days—marks the beginning of the Church year in the Western World. Originating as a pre-Christmas fast, formally so by the late 5<sup>th</sup> century into the second half of the 6th century, it lives on as a season of waiting, penitence and preparation for the celebration of Christ's nativity, the Incarnation.

Advent is also a time to ponder and prepare for Christ's second coming. Commemorating Jesus' first Advent helps us anticipate His second. The penitential aspect of Advent is reflected in the traditional color of the season, purple, which is the color of repentance. Some churches have shifted this to blue, the color of hope, to emphasize Christ's promise that He would come again, reminding us that we are not simply waiting for the coming of Christmas but ultimately waiting for Jesus' second coming.

Consistent with Cornerstone's current emphasis, Advent is an opportunity to examine our priorities and to realign our lives with God's desires for us in every area—our family, our church and our community. Each of the 4 Sundays of advent has a watchword and Biblical figure associated with the progressive lighting of a related colored candle. The colors and meanings of the candles vary.

*1st Sunday*— 'Wait', the prophet Isaiah 7:14 (first purple or blue candle's light "the light of the hope of the prophecies")

**2nd Sunday**—'Prepare', John the Baptizer, Luke 3:4 (applied, it calls us to watchfulness as we wait for Christ's return, Lk.21:34, & 1Thess. 5:2-3,6; second purple or blue candle — the peace brought to Mary & Joseph by the light and warmth of the "stable" in Bethlehem)

*3rd Sunday*—'Rejoice', Mary, whose soul magnified the Lord, Luke 1:46-49; third candle, colored pink,—(reminds us that our preparation and waiting are joy filled even in the midst of fasting and penitence, as, like Mary, we are aware that God has done great things for us; representing the light and the joy which accompanied the angels' appearance to Mary and later the Shepherds.)

4th Sunday—'Love', Joseph, who, having been told in a dream not to be afraid to marry Mary, lovingly takes her as his wife despite raised eyebrows etc, and later loves Jesus, her son as his own.; John 3:16. Also the love and support displayed in the relationship between Elizabeth & Mary; they affirm God's work in each other and thus exemplify Christian community at its best. We thus participate in the saving work of God in proclaiming Christ. Last purple or blue candle — its light represents the light of the bright star that led the faithful to the Christ child.

Some traditions finally light, on Christmas Eve, a white candle called the Christ Candle. Its color represents the purity of Christ in His sinlessness, and reminds us that those who receive Christ are washed clean of their sins.

## Possessing Our Souls in Patience at Advent

Scripture Reading: Luke 21:5-19

Believers in Jesus Christ have had several centuries to touch, taste and handle the glorious reality and ultimate Truth of Jesus' first Advent; but not so much His Second. In fact, the proclamation of His imminent return has fallen on hard times as church's shy away from a focus on what has been known throughout the ages as "The Believers' Glorious Hope".

I love the Christmas cards and nativity scenery artistically portraying the shining face of the Christ-Child in the manger, and that light reflecting from those gathered around the Holy family to adore Him. Yet, the historical facts and events, soon to follow that scene, record a brutal, ugly, God-hating world, in the not so distant backdrop. Yet those who gazed and received His Light were forever transformed; and going out from that space, proclaimed, preserved and stewarded the Best News the World has ever received and ever will.

Jesus, in Luke 21: 5-19, sought to prepare His followers for the unpleasant circumstances that would also attend His second advent—the destruction of Jerusalem, wars at home and abroad, worldwide cataclysmic events, chaos and disruptions in society and the created order, cosmic phenomena and, in it all, persecution of believers in Him. His admonition to them in verse 19 is to 'possess their souls in patience', promising that they would be imbued with supernaturally supplied responses and powerful testimonies of Him for their persecutors and captors, and that not a hair on their heads would be lost.

In this 'now and not yet' prophetic passage we, today, can testify that the disciples, just like the faithful shepherds and the holy family, did 'possess their souls in patience', in their time. The light of the Glory of God in the Face of Christ had burst forth from a Middle-Eastern tomb, and they had beheld His Glory, even of the only begotten of the Eternal Father! They waited in prayer and worship till the Spirit fell and filled them, then they faithfully delivered the Gospel to successive generations, sustained even up until our day.

How will we do in our time?

Scripture Reading: Matthew 21:1-11

So, as I read today's passage, my heart pondered what Jesus told the disciples — "Go to the village. Bring Me the donkey and her colt. If anyone asks, say that the Lord needs them." Pretty straightforward right? Now you might be wondering what this passage has to do with Christmas. I was asking myself that very question.

As I sat and listened, the Lord kept whispering two words: Anticipation and Preparation. Each Christmas season, while we gather to remember Christ's divine incarnation into our very human world, take note: this isn't intended to be a one-time event. He calls His people to incarnate His presence every day, in our very human world.

Advent offers us a chance to slow down and connect with God in a way that enables us to do this. The days leading to the celebration of His birth provide an opportunity to anticipate with joy the Light of the World. And what do we do while we wait? Sit around admiring tree trimmings and lights? Not according to the example set in this passage. The disciples made preparations for Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem according to His instructions. It isn't enough to know He's King. Preparation is the key when it comes to welcoming and ushering in a new work of God into our world and into our lives.

## The Work and Wonder of the Wait

Scripture Reading: Matthew 21:12-22

Growing up, my only real understanding of the word Advent was undeniably linked to chocolate. Each year, around Thanksgiving, we'd get one of those little cardboard calendars with all the windows in it. Then, each morning until Christmas, we'd open up one little window and start the day with a piece of, to be quite honest, pretty poor-quality chocolate. The taste didn't matter, though. It was all about the anticipation, the countdown, the wondering and waiting until that Christmas morning celebration.

Those years, though, were never about the mystery in the waiting. They were always about what was to come. Never about the process, but always about the outcome. Jesus, though, was always about the process.

In the scriptures, we see a Jesus who is not impatient for what's to come at the end: He has this deep longing for people to see what's right in front of them; to uncomplicate their view of God; to understand the simplicity of loving God and loving others. A Jesus who drives from His temple, those who complicate and pollute that simple love, and reminds those looking for rules and regulations to guide them, that faith is actually about reckless trust and audacious risk.

Lucy Shaw says that "During the waiting times God is vibrantly at work within us. And if through the Spirit of God, we have been united with the Father in dynamic relationship, if God has sown His gospel seed in us, then Jesus is being formed within us, little by little, day by day. But we have to wait if the Word is to become flesh in us. And that kind of waiting feels like work."

So, it is with advent. It's a time to be reminded that as we live in this in-between time, the time between the Savior's birth and his second coming, the wait should create a deep longing and expectation, not just that God will answer our own selfish prayers, but that we would know the Christ child. That we would expect God's movement in our world. That we would desire more than that which our own eyes can see and our own dreams can hope for.

Waiting on things we cannot see for a God to do something we don't expect is the hard and good work of faith.

#### Take a Stand!

Scripture Reading: Matthew 21:23-32

"Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" (John 1:46). Sitting under a fig tree, like the learned but with humble intentions, Nathaniel considers the Messiah's coming. What would it mean for Israel, for him and for the world? Could this be a Prophet? ...the Messiah? ...in Israel? ...NOW?

"We are surrounded by Gentiles both within and without!" he thought. "Are we adequate to ride with Messiah to cast off Rome? Israel is mixed in with the world, not knowing how to resist its press against our identity and our heritage. Our religious and national leaders are interested in us for our "fleece" more than in "leading us to green pastures". My land, Galilee of the nations; Galilee of the GENTILES, they call us! How can we be set apart, with the nations of the world in our midst? Would the Messiah come to us now? Are we ready?"

I would imagine the Israelites must have felt the same as Nathaniel, prior to the birth of the Babe in Bethlehem, 30 years earlier – small, insignificant, without power or impact in a foreign world that was surrounding them. Was this a problem or an opportunity? That depends on who they were looking for. It all sounds a lot like Christians in the world today, as we await, with great anticipation, Christ's second coming. *Matthew 21:23-32* portrays a scene in which Jesus challenges the Pharisees to declare their beliefs about John and his message; they played it safe, which revealed their dubious allegiance. Christ went on to highlight their disloyalty through a parable, calling them to... Take a stand! Repent from reneging on allegiance to their God! If God Be God, serve Him and do what they said they would do.

## The Gospel in Advent

Scripture Reading: Mathew 21:33-46

Jesus uses parables throughout the Bible to teach us, guide us, and to prepare us for His second coming. In Matthew 21:33-46, He tells the story of a landowner, a vineyard, tenants, servants and the landowner's son. The story details how people often relate, choosing to live their lives driven by greed, jealousy, selfishness, pride and rebellion, rather than by desire to serve God.

At His first Advent, God sent His Son, Jesus, to give us an example of how to live our lives daily, so that we may be prepared for His second coming. We should receive and spread the good news of the Gospel—loving as he did, sacrificing our wants and needs. As we follow Him, we can be fruitful now and not ashamed at the time of His second coming and the judgment. Jesus was beaten and rejected by many, suffering for all of our sins. However, the Father accepted His sacrifice on our behalf and raised Him from the dead! This saves us and gives us hope, for by His example, He has become our CORNERSTONE!!

Matthew 21:42 says,

"The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; the lord has done this, and it is marvelous in our eyes"

With that said, Jesus is our cornerstone, church!!!

Let's be the example and live today as He has—building each other up and not to tearing down, forgiving and being merciful to one another—this empowers us to spread His love and the good news of the Gospel. He is a Good Good Father!

## The Festivities of Advent

Scripture Reading: Matthew 22:1-14

God clearly loves feasts and the celebrations surrounding them and has built similar delight into the hearts of us humans. No other creature has behavior that compares to the uniquely human practice of festive celebration. God's instructions to Moses for His ancient people, Israel, organized their year around major feasts, with smaller ones regularly attending other aspects of their daily life, such as the sabbath. So, it's not surprising that Jesus often taught of the advancing entry of the Kingdom of God in terms of preparation for a Great Feast.

As the Advent season approached this year, I found myself wondering, for the first time, what preparations on the heaven side of things may have looked like that first Advent. My fertile imagination pictured angel-feathers flying everywhere, as the heavenly messengers delivered missives via dreams and annunciations to the relevant characters of the Christmas story, seeing to the fulfillment of prophecies and keeping demon spirits at bay. Was there a send-off feast? I know I run the risk of venturing into anthropomorphism—bringing God down to human form, yet isn't that exactly what the Incarnation was all about? God becoming Man! I wonder what the feast in heaven may have looked like if there was one? I believe Jesus gave us a hint in the parable from today's passage.

Here, in Matthew 22:1-14, Jesus draws on the practices of these ancient cultures familiar to His hearers, but with a twist that would delight the 'poor in spirit' of His audience and anger the proud and self-righteous of the religious elite. It would have been clear to the crowd who the bad players in the parable represented and who the humble folk, dragged in from the highways and byways, needing to be issued appropriate clothing.

But lest we mistakenly assume that Jesus was playing into 'classism'— elevating the 'poor in pocket' over the wealthy, His parable makes clear that no one in attendance at the feast of His coming Kingdom will do so on his or her own merit. We must all come as the 'poor in spirit'—the same fury which the King displayed against the initial guests, who esteemed their own business above the King's, and killed His messengers, is also dished out to the latter guests of humble means, who declined the covering provided in Grace. The response of the King, representative of the Heavenly Father, is completely understandable when you consider that Jesus' parable is of the Marriage Supper of the Lamb, at His second Advent, and the covering graciously provided, nothing less than the priceless blood of the Son of God Himself!

## Gifts to God

Scripture Reading: *Matthew 22:15-22* 

Some of my favorite memories are enveloped in gift-giving. When our children were little (and their gift-lists simple!) Christmas wasn't complicated—a bike or doll, roller blades or new train set. However, with each passing Christmas as the lists grew shorter, giving a gift that would spark our children's inner joy became more challenging. But thankfully, over the years I have also come to realize that giving is simple if I adhere to two guidelines:

*Know the person* (after all the gift isn't for me!)

Know what will bring them joy

Of course, the person to whom we should ultimately be concerned about giving to at Christmas is the Lord Himself, since it is His birth that we are commemorating. And I think we all know what He wants. Do you struggle with giving your life to God? I do. Honestly, what else do we have to give to the Creator of the universe?

In today's passage Jesus answers a question the Pharisees posed in trying to trap Him and Scripture tells us they were "amazed" with His reply;

"So, give back to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's." (v. 21)

Clearly, Jesus wasn't going to be fooled. Turning their question to His own end, He describes giving, not as a means to get something, but as an act of preference, of honor. I know it might sound like a leap—to honor Caesar by paying taxes—but stick with me...

In His infinite mind, God no doubt had a myriad of scenarios from which to choose when He considered how to deal with our fallen world. What was His perfect choice? To reconcile Man by giving Himself! The King of Kings chose to humble Himself and live in a way to which all people could relate. In this way, from the beginning, God set the standard for giving.

#### Sustain the Weary with Our Words

Scripture Reading: Matthew 22:23-33

I've always had a heart for those who are discouraged, feel defeated, alone, weary, ashamed or just worn out with it all and ready to give up. I have a friend who calls me Barnabas, (after Joseph the Levite in Acts 4:36), which means *Son of Encouragement*. The Jewish leaders Jesus encountered, the Sadducees, were the opposite of compassion and encouragement. They sought to justify their importance by strictly keeping the law, both of God and of their own making. But they often missed the Spirit and message behind the law. Trying to justify their *lack* of belief in a resurrection, they tried to trap Jesus in his doctrine. Jesus answered their veiled question by demonstrating that God is the God of both the living *and* the dead.

Rather than trying to poke holes in others, let's work to fill the holes left by sin. Jesus wants us to stoop down and lift up men and women who carry the weight of the world on their backs. Instead, we too often, like Sadducees, try to convince those who don't care about dogma we don't live out consistently.

I've often joked about the oft quoted phrase "GOD will never give you more than you can handle", with the response of "...I'm not sure I really want to see just how much I can handle". Proverbs 12:25 states, "Anxiety in a man's heart weighs it down, but a good word cheers it up." Whether we are at home or work or among friends; whether relating to our spouse, our sons or our daughters, consider this: that these very people, and many more around us, are likely the ones who need encouragement from us the most.

Isaiah 50:4 says "The Lord GOD has given Me the tongue of those who are instructed, to know how to sustain the weary with a word." The next time you see someone who needs a "good word", stop and "love your neighbor as yourself" (Lev 19:18); Ask GOD for the good word they need and the opening to deliver it.

No, these words of woe do not seem like what we would expect from Jesus, but then again, the world did not expect God to appear as a helpless, newborn baby in an obscure village. During this advent season of reflection and repentance, instead of reading quickly over these woes deciding they are not relevant to me, I want to re-examine my heart.

For when I come into the presence of the exalted King, I recognize my desperate need for a righteousness I cannot produce. And in Jesus, I graciously find provision not only for removing my sin, but for imparting His perfect righteousness to me.

## Out of the Casket this Advent

Scripture Reading: Matthew 23:27-39

What is wrong with hypocrisy? Regardless of how we feel about the word, it ought to be sufficient that Jesus does not like it.

Throughout most of chapter 23 of Matthew, Christ uses the phrase "Woe upon you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites!" Matthew 23:27 (KJV). At first the statement seemed harsh and accusatory. However, as I read it further, I detected Jesus' sorrow for those who believed their actions were what saved them. The scribes and Pharisees seemed to believe that it was only through human effort—the proverbial "white knuckling", that makes us right in God's eyes. In the passage, Christ describes them as nothing more than "bedazzled coffins" or, more accurately, "white washed sepulchers". Matthew 23:27 (KJV).

We too are acting as hypocrites if we only seek to make ourselves outwardly acceptable. At the end of verse seven of 1Samuel 16 (KJV) it is said "... The Lord sees not as men see; for man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart." Verse 28 of today's reading tells us that we fall into hypocrisy when we are seeking man's approval over God's, when we outwardly look one way to the world but are inwardly another way. When we chase man's accolades, we make approval our idol which then makes even 'following the law' a sin! How can we escape! Suddenly, the need of a savior becomes crystal clear.

God mercifully sent deliverance in the form of little baby Jesus. And, as He grew, He showed us how to live in the freedom of God, not by our hypocrisy. Verse 37 of today's reading shows us the nature of the relationship Christians should have with Christ. We are now part of God's chosen people. The law is not something believers are to beat each other over the head with, as many of the religious leaders did, but it is a list of reasons as to why we require Christ's aid in His Advent.

"...what will be the sign of Your coming... (v. 3)?" The greatest sign of Christ's coming will be His Church walking together in unity, standing together against the birth pains (v. 8) of a world resisting its Creator.

## Study While You Wait

Scripture Reading: Matthew 24:15-31

How prepared are you for Christ's second Advent? The Apostle Matthew lays out an examination of this very concern that the disciples expressed, as Jesus talked with them about the future of the church, before His death, resurrection and ascension. In Matthew 24:3b KJV, they ask, "Tell us, when shall these things be? and what shall be the sign of thy coming, and the end of the world?" Jesus' answer demonstrates that He wants His followers to be neither ill-informed nor unprepared.

Jesus questions and warns us, as He did them, to be vigilant and watchful of signals for the end times in today's reading from Matthew 24:15-25. Here are some conclusions I drew from His teaching here:

- (1) v. 15 When the time comes the readers of scriptures will know (whoso readeth, let him understand)
- (2) v. 16 The people of Judea will flee into the mountains (the Abomination of Desolation.)
- (3) v. 17 Those sitting on their rooftop in Palestinians homes (porch or balcony), will not have time to come down to take anything out of their house
- (4) v. 18 Workers in the field, should not return to pick up your clothes
- (5) v. 19 –There will be a great population explosion during the tribulation; and for to those giving birth to children, this will be a very difficult time.
- (6) vs. 23-25 There will be false prophets, and even some of the elect, and those of Israel, will be naive in following a false prophet.

## Secure and Ready for Advent

Scripture Reading: Matthew 24:32-44

The Christmas season invites us to take in many different activities—watching children's plays, going to holiday parties, seeing Christmas lights, shopping for gifts, baking cookies, enjoying great food, especially desserts, spending time with family and friends and often even traveling. All this makes for a sometimes-hectic time of year in which it can be a challenge to find moments of peace. For many, the anticipation and activities leading up to Christmas day is what makes the season great.

In the Bible, there were specific events mentioned, occurring before the birth of Christ, that were very important to God's purpose in sending His son. Today's reading from Matthew 24:34, finds Jesus instructing His disciples saying, "Truly I tell you; this generation will certainly not pass away until all these things have happened." Understandably, this wasn't meant for Jesus' birth but for the day of His return. We are to be aware and understand that there are specific events, both in the past and in the coming days, that must happen before Jesus returns. He further tells His disciples to be watchful, as we do not know the day or hour when He will return, but to be prepared nonetheless (Matt 24:36).

Can you imagine how devastating it would be to wake up Christmas morning to find all the gifts under the tree snatched by a thief in the night? The shock and disappointment of that however will be nothing compared to how shocked those who are unprepared will be at Jesus's second coming. Jesus alludes to this in His comment — "But understand this: If the owner of the house had known at what time of night the thief was coming, he would have kept watch and would not have let his house be broken into." (Matt 24:43).

As important as the gifts are, I believe this passage reminds us to not only be ready as believers, in that we receive salvation, but to be aware of how we are living day to day. If we are already believers, are we sharing the gospel? Are we loving others as God would want us to? Are we forgiving others as he requires us? Are we walking out our calling? Perhaps, how we conduct our lives is part of those events that must happen. Is it possible that we have a role in those events to fulfill His plan? God's purpose for us is important and even if it is to affect one person or ten thousand, we still must walk out our journey with Him and be watchful at all times. That way we will be ready for His second Advent, when our beautiful Savior comes and we are taken away to the place He is preparing for us.

But then all I have to do to free myself from the illusory fog of my inherent "goodness" and slap myself in the face with crystal-clear spiritual reality is to read these words of Jesus in this passage from Matthew 22.

Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depends all the Law and the Prophets."

-Matthew 22: 34-40, ESV

I don't think there has been even one hour of my life when I have loved God with all my heart, or one minute when I have loved God with all my soul, or one millisecond when I have loved God with all my mind. To have loved God in this thorough way, and to (for even a passing moment) have loved any or all of my neighbors for even one smidgen as much as I love myself? Nope. It hasn't happened.

But there is this miracle—that to Him, I am everything! And my grasp of that all starts with Christmas. God loves me so much that he came into this troubled world of ours, walked through its perils, and then finally died—all to prove it.

## Believing and Accepting His Invitation

Scripture Reading: John 3:16; Luke 1:1-25

I have often pictured, though not too originally, the purposes of God, in the history of the world, as a massive weaver's loom on which threads—brilliant, nondescript and dark-shaded—appear, inter-act and disappear again in God's inimitable timing. Age to age, and generation to generation He weaves and plots the eternal story of His Glory, in humanity's journey on the planet and hereafter. As with all weaving illustrations, the climax or punchline is that point at which the threads are all pulled together, the frame flipped over and the glorious tapestry of the weaver's design revealed; all in the timing desired by the Weaver. Luke, in today's reading, almost amusingly, captures the exasperation of the mighty messenger Angel from heaven, as the doubting though faithful Zachariah, hovers in unbelief, hesitant to accept with appropriate jubilation, the major plot movement in God's story into which he was being welcomed.

"... You will be mute and not able to speak until the day these things take place, because you did not believe my words which will be fulfilled in their own time." Luke 1:20 NKJV

God is often accused by agnostics and others too careless, too deceived or too distracted to look, of hiding Himself and concealing His good intentions. Yet all of the created order declares His nature, His ways and His unfathomable sovereignty over all things. Meanwhile the prophetic Scriptures – the Bible, and the prophetic people – the People of Israel and the Church, have made and corroborated God's self-revelation and bold declarations throughout the ages.

Additionally, In John 3:16, God is abundantly clear about His heart, His intentions and His plans towards Mankind, the highest of His creations. Physician, Luke—disciple of Jesus and travel companion of the Apostle Paul—faithfully records, as he put it in today's reading, "...an orderly account that we may know with certainty the things we have been taught (about the faith)." Luke 1:3-4.

How amazing a journey, he takes us on in this story at the head of his gospel, of an ordinary, faithful couple, with their own painful narrative of infertility, but which, when joined to God's, in His timing on His Great Weaver's loom, pulls it into a storyline like no other. Physically barren and spiritually numb, they yet receive miraculous grace to bring forth the forerunner of our Lord, John the baptizer, in God's timing, just as God, the Great Weaver said.

## New Names at His Coming

Scripture Reading: Luke 1:57-67

I didn't like my name growing up. It felt ordinary—the last name in a list. Let me explain. I'm the youngest of four whose parents, before it was posh, opted to begin all of their children's first name with the letter K. So the story goes, my parents had chosen the name Kelly for a girl but hadn't yet settled on one for a boy. Eventually they decided Kelly would work for either a girl or boy. But when you're eight and Mom's calling for you requires her to go through all your brothers' names before she gets to you, well...you can understand why I didn't think it was anything special.

When it came time to name our own children, my husband and I agonized over each one. The birth of our children provided the opportunity to pass down a family name—an invisible thread connecting generation to generation, so to speak. This is where we find ourselves joining John the Baptist's story in scripture today.

Zechariah had been silent for months, muted because he did not believe Gabriel. No late night "what shall we name him" discussions with Elizabeth. The day arrives. His name given. Can you hear the collective gasp when Elizabeth announces his name? Thinking Elizabeth is suffering in a post-partum fog, relatives turn to Zechariah. Surely he would be more reasonable. Confidently Zechariah writes, "His name is John." What a common name. No relatives with that name, so the people didn't understand why it was chosen. Naming a child in biblical times often had significant meanings: stating the solidarity of family ties, recording an aspect of the birth, expressing the parents' reaction to the birth, communicating a message from God, or indicating new beginning or direction in a person's life.

At the first Christmas Eve, the world awaited the birth of another child, but this one has a name which is above every name. Jesus. Immanuel. Alpha and Omega. Prince of Peace. Light of the world. The birth that radically changed the course of history and the lives of everyone who accepts Him also issues us new names, as Sons and Daughters of God, names we will know when He comes the second time in His Glory.

Scripture Reading: John 3:31-36(NIV)

<sup>31</sup> "The one who comes from above is above all; the one who is from the earth belongs to the earth, and speaks as one from the earth. The one who comes from heaven is above all.<sup>32</sup> He testifies to what he has seen and heard, but no one accepts his testimony.<sup>33</sup> Whoever has accepted it has certified that God is truthful.<sup>34</sup> For the one whom God has sent speaks the words of God, for God gives the Spirit without limit <sup>35</sup> The Father loves the Son and has placed everything in his hands. <sup>36</sup> Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life, but whoever rejects the Son will not see life, for God's wrath remains on them."

In our family Christmas morning begins with yarn – lots of yarn. You see at our house; each child's first Christmas gift is hidden somewhere on the first floor of our house and there is only one way to find it – follow the yarn! Each child's first gift has the end of an entire roll of yarn attached to it. The beginning of that roll of yarn starts downstairs in the basement where the kids have had a sleepover that night. It may be in the refrigerator, behind a couch, on top of some cabinets, in the car of the garage, or in a closet. The ups and downs, the highs and lows, and the temporary cold as they walk outside the house in their pajamas has been worth it all because at the end of the journey is their first gift of Christmas. Once everyone has found their gift, we gather together, say a prayer of thanks to God for Jesus, and let the festivities begin.

On the first Christmas day so long ago, God gave us His first and greatest gift, Jesus, The One who in John 3:31-36 is:

- (v31) above all
- (v34) speaks the words of God
- (v34) gives the Spirit of God without limit
- (v35) has everything in his hands
- (v36) and is the source of eternal life and peace with God

Your life may feel like a maze of ups and downs, twists and turns, times of cold, unending searching and hidden promises, but finding God's first and greatest gift is worth it. Once you have Jesus, you have The One who will give you peace above all your circumstances, remind you that you are never alone, and fill you with His Spirit and power to see victory in every area of life; and all that won't end with you, this gift is given to you so you can share it with those around you and a larger community that needs Him. So, don't give up on the search and don't let the clutter and busyness of this world tire you out, because when you have Jesus, you will see what true life is all about!
